## **mARTi Gras: Let the Good Times ART!**

### **Teacher & Parent Guide**

Bring a little Mardi Gras magic to your classroom or home! This simple, no-pressure activity lets kids design and decorate their own Mardi Gras masks using color, pattern, and imagination.

After finishing, families can snap a photo and tag @region8arts or email abigail@nelarts.org for a shout-out on our page.

*Let's celebrate the joy of art across Northeast Louisiana!*

#### **Art & Design Prompts**

- What shapes and colors do you see in Mardi Gras masks?
- Which materials can add texture - feathers, foil, yarn, tissue paper, ribbon, buttons?
- How can you use symmetry or pattern in your design?
- What emotion or personality does your mask show - joyful, mysterious, funny, bold?
- What kind of Mardi Gras character might wear your mask? Tell their story through design!

#### **Culture & History Prompts**

- Mardi Gras has been celebrated in Louisiana for hundreds of years - what makes it special to our state?
- What do the Mardi Gras colors mean?  
Purple = Justice   Green = Faith   Gold = Power
- Have you ever been to a parade? What did you see, hear, and feel?
- How does art help tell the story of a celebration or a community?

#### **Writing Extensions**

- Write a short story or poem about the person who might wear your mask.
- Create a “mask bio” card: give your mask a name, a favorite parade treat, and a Mardi Gras wish!
- Older students: write a paragraph about how art connects people and traditions.

#### **Display & Celebration Ideas**

- Host a mini mask parade in your classroom or hallway.
- Create a bulletin board titled “Let the Good Times ART!”
- Play Louisiana jazz or zydeco while students work to set the mood.
- Snap a group photo of all the finished masks to share with families - or tag @region8arts for a regional shout-out!

#### **Parent Prompts**

- Ask your child what inspired their design.
- Talk about how art lets us express creativity and emotion.
- Encourage using recycled materials—ribbon scraps, foil, paper bits, fabric pieces.
- Make it a family project: everyone designs a mask for a home mini-parade!
- Ask: “Which part of your mask makes you most proud?”
